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Introduction

European Baccalaureate 2013 was chaired by Mr Bernard Devlamminck (BE). A total of 1573 candidates from 13 European Schools and three accredited schools were entered for the 54th session of the European Baccalaureate. 9 pupils abandoned the examinations without obtaining the Final Baccalaureate Mark.

In order to meet students' choices of examinations for the Baccalaureate 2013, 141 experts set 180 main examination papers and 121 reserve papers, and produced 158 translations. Each examination paper was accompanied by model answers, assessment criteria, marking scheme and marking grid. That made up a total of 500 « Copies ready to press » that were delivered by the secondary inspectors.

An external expert of Dutch language was brought in by Quality Assurance Working Group to control the quality of LI-IV examination papers.

The present report will provide a general overview of the results of the European Baccalaureate 2013. The complete records can be found in the annexes.

1. Organisation

1.1. Quality control

The examinations were organised in 16 schools. Quality control of the 2013 European Baccalaureate was ensured through the presence of 25 Vice-Chairmen who observed the organisation of the written and oral examinations, for a maximum of four days per examinations center.

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1.3. Structure of the examinations


Each candidate registered for five written tests and four oral tests. The examinations for 2013 were structured for the last time before the Baccalaureate reform as follows:

1.4. Organisation of additional written papers

Article 13 of the Arrangements for Implementing the regulations for the European Baccalaureate stipulates that, in particular cases, last year students at the European Schools may enroll for a

supplementary examination of the Baccalaureate for an optional subject, whether they took the class concerning the subject in question at the school or not

Admittance to this additional Baccalaureate examination may be authorised only if documentation is provided to show that an examination in this subject is part of the conditions for admission to the higher education course on which the student wishes to embark.

In 2013, 17 students registered for an additional written paper. The majority of these examinations were scientific in nature.

1.6. Candidates with special needs


Pursuant to Article 1, paragraph 1.3.2. of the Arrangements for implementing the Regulations for the European Baccalaureate, candidates with special educational needs may submit a request via the Director of the school.

Schools, acting as examination centres, made appropriate arrangements, consisting mainly of granting extra examination time to 49 students with special needs. Several requests arrived at the last minute due to special health conditions suffered by pupils in question.

The number of such requests over the past five years appears in the table on the right.

The special arrangements granted are generally following: 10 minutes' extra time per examination hour, 10 minutes' extra time for preparation of the oral examinations, use of a computer without a spellchecker, presence of a reader and presence of a scribe.

Candidates with special needs






1.7. Administrative and contentious appeals

In accordance with Article 12 of the Arrangements for implementing the Regulations for the European Baccalaureate, an administrative appeal may be lodged with the Chairman of the Baccalaureate Examining Board.

The appeal may only concern a procedural irregularity.



Under Article 12.2 of the same Arrangements for the Regulation "There is a procedural irregularity when the provisions taken by the BoG and the BoI as to the EB are not observed". In the absence of irregularity, the administrative appeals shall be rejected.

The table on the left shows the number of appeals lodged over the past five years.

Administrative appeals

Of the 1564 candidates who took part in the examination session 2013, 5 lodged an

administrative appeal (by themselves or by a legal representative).

Among the students involved, only 1 had not passed the Baccalaureate.

- The first appeal was lodged in April 2013, against the written exams' calendar and more specifically against Article 6 (§ 6.2.2.4) which states that candidates can be required to sit two 3-hour examinations per day;
- 1 appeal was lodged against the procedure for choice of the question during 2 oral exams;
- 1 appeal was lodged against the A mark;
- 2 appeals sought upgrading of the mark in one subject, and consequently of the final mark in the Baccalaureate.

Of the 5 appeals lodged in 2013, none was based on procedural irregularity and so all of them have been rejected by the Chairman of the Baccalaureate.

Contentious appeals

Explicit or implicit administrative decisions taken on the appeals referred to in Article 12 may be the subject of a contentious appeal by a student 's legal representatives, or by the student himself or herself, directly concerned by the disputed decision, before the Complaints Board.

So far, no contentious appeal was lodged before the Complaints Board.

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^{*} At the end of European Baccalaureate 2012 a collective appeal was launched against the results in written Chemistry examination. Some of the persons who had signed the collective appeal made also an individual appeal. The total number of appeals thus includes all these appeals as well as the non-Chemistry related ones.



2. Analysis of the 2013 Baccalaureate results

2.1. Participation in the examinations by school and by language section


Of the 1573 students that entered the Baccalaureate at the start of the 2012-2013 school year, 1564 actually took the examinations, nine students having given up their studies in mid-year or during the Baccalaureate session after having passed several exams.

Twenty-two candidates were partially absent for illness during the written and/or oral examinations and had to take substitute examinations in June 2013.

One candidate was offered to take part in an extraordinary session in September 2013 due to the personal circumstances.


The largest number of candidates at the Baccalaureate came from the European School of Brussels I (242).

The largest group was made up of candidates from the English language section, with 374 students, followed by candidates from the French section (349) and the German section (276).


Number of candidates per language section



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Number of candidates per examination (written and oral)




2.2. Pass rate



2.3. Final averages

For all the candidates who participated in the 2013 session of the Baccalaureate, the average Final Marks amounted to 77,4. A comparison of the Final Marks shows a slight rise throughout the past five years.

Overall average of past five years




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
This year the average Final Marks ranged between 73,2 and 81,3 from school to school.

The average Final Mark ranged between 74,7 and 81,0 depending on the language section, even if at certain sections the number of candidates could make the average less significant.


Final Mark average per language section




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
As usual we witness here a significant difference between the two genders.

Final Mark average per gender, 2009-2013




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2.4. The Preliminary and Final Marks

The graph below shows differences between the Final Mark and the Preliminary Mark for all students who passed the Baccalaureate. A negative difference means that the Preliminary Mark is higher than the Final Mark, and vice-versa.

2.5. Breakdown of final results throughout past five years

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2.6. Most popular examination choices at written and oral examinations

The five most chosen options for the written examinations this year were: Language III (English LIII being the most popular choice, followed by the French and next the option Spanish), Biology, Physics, Chemistry and History.

2.7. Students Without A Language Section (SWALS)


This year, 116 Students Without a Language Section were entered for the Baccalaureate session.

The average Final Mark achieved by SWALS students this year amounted to 78,6. One of these candidates failed (i.e. a fail rate of 0,9 %).

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2.8. Analysis of the results in different subjects

In the European Schooling system, some subjects such as Geography, History and Economics are taught in a second language. It seems to us there are no important systematic differences between the results of the subjects taught in the second languages.

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


The average Final Mark for Language II was 7,9. By virtue of the relevant regulations, students may change Language II in the 6th year. In this way, this year students could choose Spanish, Dutch or Irish as their Language II. It is a fact that their results are substantially above the overall average, even if the number of pupils is probably too limited to arrive to conclusions that are statistically sound.

Final Mark Average by LIII course




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The evolution of the average **Final Mark for the Science Classes** (total of C, W and O marks) as set out in the graph shows substantial stability as to the results in these subjects.


3. Costs

3.1 Overall costs

The total cost of the 2013 session of the European Baccalaureate amounts to €924,124.60, which represents an average cost of € 590.87 per candidate (reminder: 1 564 candidates completed the 2013 session of the Baccalaureate).

We inform readers that the following posts did not present exhaustive costs: cost of distance corrections, cost of subjects' elaboration, cost of transport of papers.

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For the second time, meetings have been organised to analyse the proposals for questions put forward by the schools in view of oral examinations of the Baccalaureate. This renewed enterprise, an initiative by the Inspectors, is to be viewed as an effort to constantly improve the quality of the European Baccalaureate.

This year as well the costs for the chairmanship include the costs related to transfer of the Chair of the Examining Board and his escort during the school year (visits to the European Schools), and no longer only during the period of the examinations of the Baccalaureate.

3.2. Costs related to subjects' elaboration

The total cost for the elaboration of **301** examination subjects required for this session of the Baccalaureate (180 main and 121 reserve papers) amounts to €243,694.94, an average examination costing €809.62.

In the graphic below this cost is broken down by phase.

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The **preselection** phase of subjects deals with meetings where the Inspector, accompanied by his group of experts, analyses the proposals of subjects sent by the schools and makes a first choice of potential questions to be included into the final subjects (main subject and its reserve copy). For science subjects, only the Inspector and a restricted core of experts (vehicular languages) take part in that meeting.

The **selection phase** of subjects is dealt with at meetings where the Inspector, accompanied by his complete team of experts, develops the final subject, departing from proposals chosen in the preselection phase. The Inspector produces at this stage the « **copy ready to print** » for literary subjects, reserve subjects, solutions, correction criteria and mark grids.

As to science subjects, the selection phase deals with the elaboration of the final subject in any of the vehicular languages. This subject will then serve as base for being translated into the other languages required, for the current session. Solutions, criteria for correction and mark grids are also prepared. The reserve **subjects** are dealt with at a separate meeting.

The **monitoring** phase of the subjects is dealt with at meetings where the Inspector, accompanied by his complete team of experts, monitors the final subject in detail. The last modifications judged relevant are then added and the subject is considered to be final. Each expert adapts his or her language version to these modifications.


The science subjects, translated into various languages, require an additional phase called « **Ready for printing** ». That meeting is directed by the Inspector, assisted in his or her task by the limited core of initial experts. It concerns a final checkup of all language versions of the subject which leads to the Inspector releasing the « copy ready for printing » for each version.

Costs related to the phase of the **orals** refer to meetings organised by certains inspectors, with their team of experts, intended to analyse the proposals for questions brought in by the schools in view of the oral examinations of the Baccalaureate. This cost is recorded for the first time in the final costs of the Baccalaureate, since it is a new measure in the framework of the process of organisation and quality control of the Baccalaureate examinations.

3.4. Cost per written and oral examination

At the 2013 session of the Baccalaureate, **14 093** examinations were entered into the ledger, broken down as follows:

7 837 written examinations were corrected by **163** external correctors, of whom **32** at a distance (where there were only 12 or less than 12 copies to be corrected) for a total of **200** corrected copies at a distance (see table below). The total cost for correction of copies this year amounts to €**244,314.26**, i.e. an average cost of €**31.17** per copy.

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


Costs Evolution for written and oral examiners 2007-2013

3. 5. Cost of the Baccalaureate for schools of Type II in Parma, Helsinki and Manosque

In keeping with decisions by the BoG of April 2011 (cf. 2011-12-D-17-fr-1 « Rectification to decisions of the BoG meeting of 12-14 April 2011 – 2011-04-D-7-fr-3 »), «as from the 2012 session of the Baccalaureate, accredited schools providing European education shall be billed only at the average cost of the organisation of the European Baccalaureate, by Ebac student, multiplied by the number of pupils enrolled at the examination session. »

For this session, the average cost per student amounts to €590,87.

32 students entered the Baccalaureate 2013 in Parma. This school of type II will therefore be billed for an amount of €18,907.84.

8 students entered the Baccalaureate 2013 in Helsinki. This school of type II will therefore be billed for an amount of €4,726.96.

8 students entered the Baccalaureate 2013 in Manosque. This school of type II will therefore be billed for an amount of €4,726.96.

For convenience 's sake, the overall results of the past ten European Baccalaureate sessions are shown in Annexes I and II.
