Introduction

The European Baccalaureate 2014 session was chaired by Mr Kiril Bankov (BG). A total of 1807 pupils from 13 European Schools and 4 Accredited Schools registered for the 55th session of the European Baccalaureate. 18 candidates abandoned the examinations session. 31 candidates failed. Therefore, 50 candidates were not awarded the European Baccalaureate Diploma.

146 experts participated in the elaboration of 157 main examination papers and 135 reserve papers. 154 translations were produced. Each examination paper was accompanied by suggested answers, assessment criteria, marking instructions and marking grid. That made up a total of 492 « Copies ready to print » that were approved by the secondary inspectors.

The present report will provide a general overview of the results of the European Baccalaureate 2014. The complete records can be found in the annexes.



1. Organisation

1.1. Quality control

The examinations were organised in 17 schools. Quality control of the 2014 European Baccalaureate session was ensured through the presence of 29 Vice-Chairmen. They supervised the proceedings of the written examinations for 1 or 2 days and also monitored the oral examinations for a maximum of four days in each examination center.

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


1.3. Structure of the examinations

The Baccalaureate reform entered into force in the year 2014. All candidates sat 5 written examinations and 3 oral examinations.

1.4. Organisation of additional written examinations



Article 13 of the Arrangements for Implementing the regulations for the European Baccalaureate establishes that candidates may be allowed to sit for an additional written examination of an option subject.

Admission may be authorised only if supporting documents are provided in order to show that an examination in this subject is part of the conditions for admission to the higher education course on which the pupil wishes to enrol.

In 2014, 16 pupils registered for an additional written examination. In all cases it concerned scientific subjects.



1.6. Candidates with special needs

Pursuant to Article 1.3. of the Arrangements for implementing the Regulations for the European Baccalaureate, candidates with special educational needs may qualify for special arrangements for the taking of their examinations.

Appropriate arrangements were made for 99 pupils with special educational needs (an increase of 53% from the year before).

These are the most common special arrangements that were granted:


- 10 minutes' extra time per examination hour.
- 10 minutes' extra time for preparation of the oral examinations.
- Use of a computer without a spellchecker.
- Presence of a reader and presence of a scribe.



1.7. Administrative and contentious appeals

In accordance with Article 12 of the Arrangements for implementing the Regulations for the European Baccalaureate, an administrative appeal may be lodged with the Chairman of the Baccalaureate Examining Board.

Number of Appeals



The appeal may only concern a procedural irregularity.

Under Article 12.2. of the same Arrangements for the Regulation "There is procedural irregularity when provisions taken by the Board of Governors and the Board of Inspectors as to the European Baccalaureate are not observed'. the absence of irregularity, administrative appeals shall be rejected.

The table on the left shows the number of appeals lodged over the past five years.

• Administrative appeals

Of the 1788 candidates who took part in the examination session 2014, 10 lodged an administrative appeal, 9 of them showing disagreement with the marks obtained in the final examinations, written or oral. These cases, not based on procedural irregularity, have been rejected by the Chairman of the Baccalaureate.

• Contentious appeals

Administrative decisions taken on the appeals referred to in Article 12 may be the subject of a contentious appeal. Contentious appeals can be lodged before the Complaints Board by the candidate himself or by his/her legal representatives, if they are minors.

Two contentious appeals were lodged before the Complaints Board in the 2014 Baccalaureate session.

An appeal against the low mark obtained for the written Chemistry examination due to typing errors in the examination paper was finally dropped because of the satisfactory interim measures proposed (an adaptation of the mark for the written examination and the recalculation of the final mark).

A second appeal against the final Baccalaureate mark waived the decision of the President of the Board of Examiners who subsequently issued a new decision.

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^{*} At the end of European Baccalaureate 2012 a collective appeal was launched against the results in the written Chemistry examination. Some of the people who had signed the collective appeal also made an individual appeal. The total number of appeals thus includes all these appeals as well as the ones not related with the Chemistry examination.



2. Analysis of the 2014 Baccalaureate results


2.1. Participation in the examinations by school and by language section

Of the 1807 pupils registered for the Baccalaureate at the start of the 2013-2014 school year, 1789 actually took part in the examinations, 18 pupils having given up their studies in mid-year or during the Baccalaureate session.


17 candidates were partially absent for illness during the written and/or oral examinations and had to take substitute examinations in June 2014. 11 candidates were absent due to participating in National Examinations.

One candidate was allowed to take part in an extraordinary session in September 2014 due to personal circumstances.

The largest number of Baccalaureate candidates per school came from the European School of Brussels II (254).



The largest number of Baccalaureate candidates per language section can be found in the French language sections, with 450 candidates, followed by candidates from the English sections (421) and the German sections (310).






2.2. Success rate


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2.3. Average Final Marks


The average Final Mark of the European Baccalaureate 2014 session was 77,3. In the last five years we can observe stability.

The average Final Mark per school ranged between 74,1 and 82,4.


Average Final Mark per school






The average Final Mark per language section ranged between 73,9 and 82,3.




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2.4. Breakdown of final results throughout past five years

The overview of the results of the past 5 years shows a progressive trend, even though moderate, for the improvement of the overall results.






Female candidates score a higher Final Mark as it can be observed in this graph.

This is a general trend in the last 5 years.


Final Mark average per gender, 2010-2014



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




2.6. The Preliminary and Final Marks

The graph below shows differences between the Final Mark and the Preliminary Mark for all pupils who passed the Baccalaureate. A negative difference means that the Preliminary Mark is higher than the Final Mark, and vice-versa.

Differences between Preliminary Mark and Final Mark (Ranges)




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We can observe that 73,7 percent of the candidates got a higher Preliminary Mark as compared to their Final Mark. However in 67,7 percent of these cases the difference was never bigger than 0,5. If we take in consideration the candidates who got a difference between Preliminary Mark and Final Mark up to 0,5 then we can say that 93,9 percent of the candidates show a maximum deviation of 0,5. Therefore, the Preliminary Mark could be interpreted as a quite accurate prediction of the Final Mark.

2.7. Differences between Preliminary Mark and First Correction






Teacher gave a higher mark in the written examination

2.8. Difference between the First and Second Correction





65,43 percent of candidates received higher mark from their first corrector. In 47,72 percent of the cases the difference between the first and second mark in written examinations was of 0,5.

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2.9. Most popular examination choices in written and oral examinations



The five most chosen options for the written examinations this year were: Language III (English LIII being the most popular choice, followed by French and Spanish), Physics, Biology, Chemistry and History. This shows the importance that pupils give to the learning of foreign languages regardless of their academic orientation.



Language III candidates: choice of written and/or oral scientific examination




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2.10. Students Without A Language Section (SWALS)


This year, 161 Students Without A Language Section registered for the European Baccalaureate session. 157 pupils sat the examinations.

The average Final Mark achieved by SWALS pupils this year came up to 78,8. Three SWALS candidates failed (i.e. a fail rate of 1,9%).

In the next graph we can see their performance in Languages II, III and IV. We can observe that their marks in Language II are higher than the average although for the rest of the languages (Language III and IV) are lower.



Final Mark for L2, L3 and L4




In the following table we can see the performance of SWALS pupils per subject compared to pupils in their language sections. As it can be observed there is no significant deviation of marks even for those subjects taught through Language II (in yellow) where one could expect that SWALS pupils would score higher.

2.11. Final Mark Average for Science Classes

2.12. Analysis of the results of courses taught in Language II for pupils who changed it in year 6.

The average Final Mark for Language II was 7,85. The current regulations foresee that pupils may change in the 6th year under certain conditions (see Digest of Decisions of the Board of Governors of the European Schools (ref.: 2014-02-D-14-en-2), Chapter XVIII). The Final Language II Mark of the pupils who chose an examination in Spanish, Dutch or Italian was substantially above the overall average. None of these candidates chose the 4 option course in Geography or History, and only 4 candidates took an oral examination in either Geography 2 or History 2.



It can be observed that their marks in subjects taught through their original Language II is considerably below the average. However, the number of pupils is too small to arrive at statistically significant conclusions.

2.13. Analysis of the results of Scientific courses

Comparison of Frequency of Marks Between Chemistry Written Exam and Chemistry Final Mark 2014




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


The graph shows that the results in the written Chemistry examination deviate from the overall results. We can observe a group of candidates whose mark ranges between 7 and 10. In this range we can see a typical Gauss curve. However, we have also a big number of pupils whose performance is under the pass mark. This is an atypical distribution with 32 percent of fails in the written examination.

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We can see that the number of failures in the Physics written examination is lower, 16 percent, and in Biology, 19 percent, compared to the 32 percent in Chemistry.

The graphs also show more uniformity in Physics and Biology between the written examination mark and the Final Mark.

A meeting took place on the 16 and 17 October among the Chemistry experts, Chemistry coordinators and the Inspector responsible to analyse this issue and to propose measures in order to assure the quality and reliability of the Chemistry written examination for the coming Baccalaureate sessions.

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


3. Costs

3.1 Overall costs

The total cost of the 2014 session of the European Baccalaureate amounts to €963,581.72, which represents an average cost of € 538,61 per candidate (reminder: 1789 candidates registered for the 2014 session of the Baccalaureate).

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3.2. Costs related to the elaboration of the examination papers

The total cost for the elaboration of **292** examination papers required for this session of the Baccalaureate (157 main and 135 reserve papers) amounts to €**223,317.74**, i.e. an average cost per paper of €**764.79**.

In the graphic below this cost is broken down by phase.

The **preselection** phase of exam questions deals with meetings where the Inspector, accompanied by a group of experts, analyses the proposals of exam questions sent by the schools and makes a first choice to be included into the main (original) paper and its reserve paper. For scientific papers, only the Inspector and a restricted core of experts (vehicular languages) take part in this meeting.

In the **selection** phase, the Inspector accompanied by his full team of experts, develops the final paper, based on the questions chosen in the preselection phase. For literary subjects, the Inspector produces at this stage the main paper and the reserve paper « **copy ready to print** », suggested answers, correction criteria and instructions and marking grids.

As to science subjects, the selection phase deals with the elaboration of the main (original) paper in one of the vehicular languages. This paper will then serve as original and will be translated into the required languages for the current session. Suggested answers, correction criteria and instructions and marking grids are also prepared. The reserve **papers** are dealt with at a separate meeting.

The **monitoring** phase of the papers is dealt with at meetings where the Inspector, accompanied by his complete team of experts, monitors the final paper in detail. The last modifications judged relevant are then added and the paper is considered to be finalised. Each expert adapts his or her language version to the modifications introduced.


The science subjects translated into different languages may require an additional phase called "**Ready to print**". The Inspector assisted by a limited core of experts runs a final checkup of all language versions. Once this has been done, the Inspector releases the copy "ready to print" for each language version.

Costs related to the phase of the **orals** refer to meetings organised by certain Inspectors with their team of experts in order to analyse the proposals for questions brought in by the schools. This cost is recorded in the final costs of the Baccalaureate, since it is part of the process of organisation and quality control of the Baccalaureate examinations.

In 2014, for the third time, meetings have been organised to analyse the Baccalaureate oral exam questions proposed by the schools. This initiative of the Inspectors has been welcomed and constitutes a valuable element towards the assurance of the quality of the European Baccalaureate.

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3.5. Correction cost per written examination

During the 2014 session of the Baccalaureate, **14 328** examinations were entered into the ledger, broken down as follows:

■ 8 961 written examinations were corrected by 221 external correctors, of whom 39 corrected at distance (distance correction took place when there were only 12 or less than 12 copies to be corrected). A total of 223 copies were corrected at distance (see table below). The total cost for correction of copies this year amounts to €282,581.46, i.e. an average cost of €31.53 per copy.





3. 7. Cost of the Baccalaureate for Accredited Schools: Parma, Helsinki, Manosque and Strasbourg

In keeping with decisions by the BoG of April 2011 (cf. 2011-12-D-17-fr-1 « Rectification to decisions of the BoG meeting of 12-14 April 2011 – 2011-04-D-7-fr-3 »), «as from the 2012 session of the Baccalaureate, accredited schools providing European education shall be billed only at the average cost of the organisation of the European Baccalaureate, by European Baccalaureate pupil, multiplied by the number of pupils enrolled at the examination session. »

For this session, the average cost per pupil amounts to €538,61.

35 pupils entered the Baccalaureate 2014 in Parma. This Accredited School will therefore be billed for an amount of €18,851.35.

13 pupils entered the Baccalaureate 2014 in Helsinki. This Accredited School will therefore be billed for an amount of €7,001.93.

6 pupils entered the Baccalaureate 2014 in Manosque. This Accredited School will therefore be billed for an amount of €3,231.66.

34 pupils entered the Baccalaureate 2014 in Strasbourg. This Accredited School will therefore be billed for an amount of €18,321.74.
